20th Feb Adult Support & Protection Day

1 - #SeeSomethingSaySomething

Are you concerned that an adult is being harmed, or is at risk of harm? Remember that they may not be able to report it themselves. You can share your concerns with your local social work team - or if you think they are in immediate danger, call the Police on 999.

Harm comes in many forms, including physical, psychological, financial and sexual harm - but harm can also mean neglect or self-neglect. If you're worried an adult could be at risk, it's always better to say something than do nothing. Watch the video below to find out more.

Harm can happen anywhere - in someone's home, at work, or even in a public place such as a hospital or day centre. When an adult is being harmed it is often caused by the people closest to them. Don't let someone suffer in silence. If you see something, say something.

2 - Sextortion

Sextortion can happen to both men and women. To avoid becoming a victim, remain cautious while using the internet, stay in control of what you do, and never be pressurised into sharing sexual content if someone asks. Watch the video below to find out more.

Sextortion scams are on the rise, with criminals targeting men and women on social media sites, dating apps and live streaming sites. If someone is threatening to share explicit images of you, don't panic and NEVER pay them. Contact the Police who will treat your case seriously and in confidence.

If you're worried that someone you know could be at risk of harm from sextortion scams, you can report your concerns to your local social work team. If they have already fallen victim to a scam, you should advise them not to pay the offender and contact the Police to report it.

The ASP webpages

These have been arranged as **two** areas of webpages.

The first is intended for the **public** and is found here: <u>Adult support and protection | NHS Highland (scot.nhs.uk)</u>. It gives the contact information to use for members of the public seeking to report an Adult concern and also a map of our areas. It also has links to Other Organisations, Videos and Publications.

The second area is intended for "protection professionals" and has seven pages. The first page is found here: Local ASP Procedures | NHS Highland (scot.nhs.uk) . This page explains how professionals should report concerns and has links to the Adult Concern Form for that purpose. It also has a brief explanation of the Highland Adult Protection Committee. Towards the bottom of that page, there are six links to further pages:

National Legislation and Guidance – containing current legislative, regulatory and practice guidance information in respect of Adult Support & Protection.

Local ASP Procedures – our local procedures and processes

News Items, Newsletters and Audits – assorted pieces of information including the audit reports from case audits.

Protection topics – brief information about a wide variety of protection topics and links to further information about these.

Tools and links – links to external resources and other organisations.

ASP Training – information about our training courses: (nhsh.scot/HighlandASPTraining).

At the bottom of all the pages, there is a short survey, asking people their views on the pages, which anyone can complete, if they wish.

ASP APP (SSSC)



This app has been developed to be used as a reference resource for all workers whose role includes supporting or caring for adults. It is designed to be used in conjunction with the worker's own organisation's adult support and protection policies and procedures. There are sections on the signs and symptoms of harm and abuse; what workers should do if they have concerns; and the legislation that applies to adult support and protection. There is also a 'Frequently Asked Questions' section that covers common issues and dilemmas relating to adult support and protection.

First ASPire (Adult Support and Protection innovation and reflection event) session – November 2023

In Nov 23 we saw the first ASPire (Adult Support and Protection innovation and reflection event) session via Teams. The programme included two brilliant inputs from colleagues involved with ASP as part of their daily remits. Ann Hayne provided a really interesting input in relation to the Interface between MARAC processes and Domestic Abuse legislation and ASP processes and legislation. This highlighted some of the ways in which these two pieces of legislation and related processes can compliment each other and lead to better and more robust support and protection for survivors of domestic abuse. The second key input came from Frances Toland and invited participants to explore with her the opportunities to think about how we might ensure we intrinsically embed Trauma Informed Practice within ASP processes, policy and practice.

It is the intention that the ASPire events hopefully be scheduled 4 times per year, via teams and 1 annual face to face day, we will keep you up to date when the dates are released.

ASP Codes of Practice



Since the introduction of <u>The Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007</u> in 2008, and publication by the Scottish Government of the Adult Support and Protection Code of Practice in 2014, there have been a number of policy, legislative and practice developments, both in the overall context of adult support and protection and in day-to-day activity.

This revised version of the Code of Practice aims to capture these changes and inform the development of local and national multi-agency adult protection procedures, processes and training across Scotland. It will also help to support the care and protection of adults who may be at risk of harm. This Code is for all those who may know adults at risk of harm whether they work in the local authority, health, police, or the third sector. The approaches set out build on the culture and ethos of partners who believe, as I do, that while there are specific duties associated with certain professional roles and public bodies, adult support and protection is "everyone's business". We all have a part to play in supporting the care and protection of adults who may be at risk of harm and are unable to safeguard themselves.

Trauma Informed Working with people with Learning Disabilities



NHS Education for Scotland (NES) have created a new animation to highlight the specific issues for people with learning disabilities in relation to psychological trauma – watch this seven-minute animation here.

A new online learning resource on the use of the law when supporting adults who lack capacity to make some or all of their own decisions was launched in June by the Mental Welfare Commission for Scotland and NHS Education for Scotland (NES). The learning site is for professionals working in Health, Social Work and Social Care across Scotland. It follows a major report in 2021 by the Mental Welfare Commission on the use of the law when discharging individuals from hospital to care home. This is a great resource for everyone to learn more about the Adults with Incapacity legislation.

National LSI Guidance work



Iriss and the Scottish Government are pleased to announce that work has begun on developing National Guidance for Large Scale Investigations (LSIs). It will build on the work published in 2023 by Iriss, the <u>Adult Support and Protection National Large Scale Investigation Framework</u>. The aim of the forthcoming Guidance is to increase the consistency and quality of LSIs across Scotland – how they are instigated, conducted, concluded and reported.

The Guidance is being developed via a short-life working group of Adult Support and Protection professionals from across Scotland, all of whom have considerable experience in LSIs. The first meeting took place in January – it was a very productive session, where everyone shared good practice and highlighted issues that the guidance needs to address. We plan to meet on a 4-6 weekly basis for the first half of 2024, and then the Guidance will be written up in the second half of the year.

Already some key issues to be addressed by the Guidance have come to light – these include clarity over the start and end of an LSI, the role of prevention, joint working across different professional disciplines, being alert to LSIs in the community and health settings (as well as in care homes), and working positively with providers. We hope it's going to be of real, practical use to all working in Adult Support and Protection in Scotland.

Margaret Fleming Significant Case Review published



AN independent inquiry into the circumstances leading to the death of Margaret Fleming has been published, Wednesday 18 October 2023, with a series of wide-ranging recommendations being proposed.

The inquiry, known as a Significant Case Review (SCR), was commissioned to examine the role of all the agencies that were involved with Margaret and the circumstances that led to her death.

An SCR is normally held when a person involved with health and social care services has died or suffered significant harm.

In Margaret Fleming's case, the SCR was jointly commissioned by the Adult Protection Committee and Child Protection Committee and led by Professor Jean MacLellan OBE.

Prof MacLellan spoke to more than 100 people, including Margaret's family and friends, during the course of the wide-ranging review and a series of recommendations have been made for all agencies involved to consider and look to implement.

Additional workings and research carried out as part of the extensive review has also been published to help with learning for professional organisations and individuals.
